GLAD YOU ASKED — Some Followup

In the last Newsletter, we responded to questions about why some people's names never appeared in the "News About Sky Soldiers" column. There is some encouragement in the knowledge that most dues payments received in the intervening period have been accompanied by filled out membership forms. In addition to letting your fellow Sky Soldiers know what is happening to you, a correct telephone number lets us contact you when mail is returned because the Post Office has reorganized routes, changed Zips, or the gremlin that resides in our computer has done some unilateral changes. THANKS AND KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK!

A frequently asked question concerns membership cards and why some Sky Soldiers don't seem to get them on a timely basis. As a result of a decision at the 1992 convention, LIFE Membership Cards are a hard plastic permanent card issued by the National Headquarters. They take about 6-8 weeks to procure. We will continue to issue the paper LIFE membership cards as a temporary card until we run out. By this time, all Sky Soldiers who were Life members before 1 Jan 93 should have their permanent LIFE membership cards.

Annual cards are necessary in our organization, as they are in other organizations, to provide members with a reminder of when dues are payable (1 January of each year). To avoid confusion, and to save printing costs for the Chapters, the National Board of Directors determined that only National Headquarters would issue annual membership cards. National members receive their cards directly from National Headquarters. Chapter members receive their membership card from National Headquarters through their Chapter Headquarters. GLAD YOU ASKED!

Recently, 23 years after he watched the medical evacuation of his wounded Vietnamese interpreter and friend Nhon Binh Nguyen, Maj. Gen. Hugh Shelton and Nguyen were

Shelton, commander of the Fort Bragg, N.C.-based 82nd Airborne Division, was a captain in 1969 when he served with Nguyen in the 173rd Airborne Bde, as commander of Co. C, 4th Bn., 503rd Inf.

When Shelton left Vietnam, he left a letter for Nguyen, but never heard from him. Then, several months ago, Shelton and his wife got a phone call from Grand Rapids, Mich.; a woman said, "We've got a Vietnamese man here who has

been asking for you constantly."


Shelton said "I almost dropped my teeth."

Nguyen and his wife had come to the U.S. in 1989, but hadn't been able to locate Shelton until that moment.
"It was terrific to hear from him," said Shelton, who met

with Nguyen and his family in Fayetteville, N.C.

"I knew then that he had survived the ordeal, and I was walking on cloud nine for about three days later," Shelton added. "I'd often wondered what happened to him and his family." Shelton had often imagined that Nguyen, as a U.S. ally, had been killed by the communists. - Compiled from news clips.



Notice of By Laws Committee Meeting

In accordance with Article IX, Section 1 of the Society's bylaws, the general membership by this notice, is being informed that the By-laws Committee will be convening during the 1993 reunion and will consist of the Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Judge Advocate. The general membership can suggest changes to the by-laws in writing and should be addressed to: International Headquarters, Society of the 173rd Airborne Brigade, P.O. Box 27822, Washington, DC 20038-0822. All suggested amendments should be submitted in accordance with the by-laws.

ARTICLE IX Amendments

Section 1. There shall be a By-Laws Committee appointed by the President annually.

Section 2. By-Laws may be adopted, amended, or repealed by two thirds vote of the membership at any Annual Membership Meeting.

No such action can be taken unless the proposed changes have been mailed to the By-Laws Committee at least forty-five (45) days prior to the Annual Membership meeting (10 July 1993)

The By-Laws Committee shall put such proposals into proper form. The Committee shall then mail such proposals to the Board of Directors at least ten (10) days prior to the annual Membership Meeting.

The members may, by two-thirds vote, agree to waive the notice requirements and vote on any such proposals.

Section 3. Amendment by Directors

By-Laws may be adopted, amended or repealed by a three fourths vote of the Board of Directors, provided that any such action shall be ratified by a two-thirds vote of the members present at the Annual Membership Meeting.

Six Sky Soldiers Return to Viet Nam

Six Sky Soldiers from the 173 ABN, BDE, started this journey on July 10, 1992. One (Larry Smith) was separated in Hong Kong due to an airline mistake, but Larry arrived a day late and spent two weeks teaching in Saigon. He really enjoyed himself.

The five of us landed at Tan Son Nhut Airport where we spent three days in Saigon before starting our journey. We traveled to Vung Tau, Bien Hoa, Dalat (it's still beautiful), Phan Rang, and Quinhon. After spending the night at Quinhon, we were packed and ready to go to Ankhe when John and Ken informed us they were staying because of traveling exhaustion.

The three of us and our three Vietnamese friends headed up to Ankhe. The famous pass is now overgrown. We stopped at the hairpin turn for awhile. The town has grown and the base is completely gone. All that is left is Hong Kong Mountain!

Later in the afternoon, we headed up Highway 1 to Bong Son. We arrived a couple of hours before dark, so we walked down the main street of Bong Son. The people were very happy to see us there. We wore our Ranger berets and 173rd shirts with most of the people's approval. Most everyone came out to see us with smiles

some pictures, flew some American flags and 173rd colors. We came back through Bong Son again and ate breakfast across the bridge. The old French bunker is still there. What memories. I remember when we had all worked that A.O. with the Bats, the Rangers and myself with C. Rangers I.F.F.V. and C/2nd Bat 503rd INF. We also stopped at L.Z. Uplift for half an hour, it is completely gone except for a few shell casings and barbed wire.

We headed back to Quinhon and picked up the other two. We then left for Nha Trang. We spent the night on the town and stayed in a nice hotel, on the beach, looking at Hon Tre Island. Carlos and I talked about pulling missions around Nha Trang and going through 5th Special Forces Recondo School and about our time in the hospital there.

We left the next morning heading back to Saigon passing Phan Thiet along the way. We pulled a lot of Ranger missions from there. It took us roughly 12 hours to get to Saigon because the road conditions are not the best.

We had three days left, so Vin had us (Carlos, Jesus, and myself) stay at his house with his family. They treated us great.

and hello's. The children were fascinated with us. The people remember the 173rd with good memories, or at least most did. They said we treated them good and wished we were there now because the economy is terrible!

One old V.C. identified himself and told us, "The V.C. called the 173rd, "The Nails' "because they could not run the herd out of any area, but other American forces they could. He was honest about his feelings toward us. He was still bitter because we killed and crippled a lot of his friends and people from his country.

There is a large V.C. cemetary just north of L.Ž. English, one of the many we have seen along this journey. One in Chu Lai has 10,000 marked V.C. graves. We spent the night about 15 miles above L.Z. English. The next morning we found L.Z. English, but the only thing left was part of the runway. We took

Book Review

BLOOD ON THE RISES Author: John Leppelman

Published by: Ballantine Books, 1991

Every Veteran of the Vietnam War has a story to tell of their experiences. All could, and many talk about writing a book, few have actually stopped procrastinating and put pen to paper. Those that do are usually served with the critical judgment of those that never will.

I joined with a group of Australians in 1987 and travelled to Santa Rosa in 1989 for the National Reunion hosted by Chapter X. After some thirty hours of travelling, I'd developed quite a thirst. After checking into the Tropicana Hotel, my good mate Bill Blaikie and I made a bee line for the bar.

The bar attendant was an attractive slip of girl, and hardly looked old enough to serve the beers we requested. The beer glasses were small compared with the 15 ounce glasses we were accustomed to back in Australia, a quick tip of the head and our glasses were empty. Two more quick beers, and dragging our eyes from the shapely figure of the bar attendant we glanced around the bar. Between us and the end of the bar was about twelve stools, on the last stool was a bloke holding his glass and slowly rotating the remains of his beer, other than a love sick couple sitting at a table at the far corner we were the only others in the bar. Looking up from his glass from the end of the bar the bloke smiled and asked "are you guys Herd?" "Aussies" we replied in unison as if rehearsed. Together we left our stools and met at the middle of the bar. With hands extended we introduced ourselves, his right hand firmly griping mine and his other cupped over the top "Leppelman" . . . "Lepp". Introductions done, we had a number of beers together. It was two days prior to the start of the Reunion, we would over the next week enjoy many hours in "Lepp's" company.

During our many sorties in search of the amber fluid, the area around the bar stools would be knee deep in brass and grenade pins as we compared the jungle tactics of the 173d, Rangers and the Aussies. We listened intently to Lepp and he to us, we told him what he'd been told before, "Put your stories on paper, write book mate".

Lepp arrived Down Under in July '91 for our reunion, we again met in the bar, this time no introductions were necessary, we simply continued on from where we had left off some two years prior, with one exception, Lepp handed me a copy of his just released book. On the inside cover he had written a special message. It would be some months before I would find the time to read in his words, "His misadventures".

His book begins after our Australian Battalion had left South Vietnam and its' service as part of the 173rd Airborne Brigade (Sep). The Australian Army throughout the war rotated whole units each year, units would return to Australia for approximately twelve months before returning to South Vietnam. It appears from his annotations that the "Herd" that he joined in 1967 was a totally different unit than that with which we Aussies operated with during 65-66.

Lepp was assigned to C/2 503d, he tells of his arrival and assignment to the 2nd Platoon, he tells of the adjustment required being a "new guy", the fact that he was issued with faded, used jungle fatigues and an M-16 that was well used, his thoughts of what happened to the last guy that carried his M-16.

When I first met Lepp I had summed him up as a "straight shooter" who in my mind, would have, in his younger days, tended to . . . shoot from the hip. Reading his own words it was quite evident that he didn't tolerate fools, but also, was immature and had not developed the ability to manipulate a situation without drawing attention to himself. A tendency to open his month before his mind, would continue to plague him throughout his three tours.

He expressed his jubilation in being able to participate in Operation Junction City, in what would be the only Combat Jump of the war. He showed his short time knowledge of all Armies the world over, when he aired his distrust and disapproval at rear-echelon personnel endeavouring to further their military careers by wrangling a chute. Career Soldiers have since the days of the Trojan Horse always known where is the right place to be, I'm sure that if history could tell us, we'd find that some desk jockey was inside the Trojan Horse as it was dragged into the City of Troy.

Lepp's description of his Platoon's operational procedure is personalized and does not wander off into an overview of Brigade Operations. His thoughts and actions are those of a soldier with a small group of his mates with the war around them. Their war is in the bush twenty feet away or around the next bend in the trail and he tells it that way. I found I could relate to the happenings around him, the RTO humping the extra weight of the radio and two spare batteries, the M-60 gunner crawling under the bamboo or hooked up by a "wait awhile" vine, cold rations, no rations, dirty water, poor equipment, the gut wrenching loss of a mate, no sleep and the frustration of humping for days without results. He told it as it was in a way that those that stomped through the jungles of Vietnam could relate.

Personalities and the perplexity of poor leadership seemed to become a problem with Lepp and in particular his Platoon Sergeant and LT. He extends his tour and transfers from patrolling the jungle to patrolling up and down coast and water ways of Vietnam. It is not long before he again has to deal with fools and again continually "shoots from the hip." His description of the city of Hue during the Tet offensive will stand the hair on your neck.

A further extension of his tour and Lepp is a LRRP. As a Ranger he is now operating more along the lines of the Australian Army's way of fighting a Jungle War. We preferred to operate in small squads and platoon sized patrols. Lepp has continually objected to the noise made by large troop movements during his period with the 173d. Operating under the strict personal discipline required to succeed as a Ranger, Lepp developed bush skills and seemed to find himself. Shooting from the hip seemed to the way to survive in the Rangers as they worked hard and played even harder.

Airborne, is the heart of this story. I first met John Leppelman in 1989, after reading the words he put to paper I feel I have known Lepp for years. I recommend that you read his story and get to know him.

In general, we found the South Vietnamese people wish Americans were still there. A lot of changes have taken place. There are controlled check points checking your papers, new homes along Highway 1, towns have grown, many North Vietnamese are living in the south, very little refrigeration, and mostly Soviet vehicles (very little American vehicles left). Vietnamese would say Soviet and European #10, American #1.

Re: Humour From the Field

The Australian Soldier is a Jungle Warfare specialist, most of our training prior to our tour Vietnam was in what to expect from the Viet Cong. Knowledge passed on to us from our NCOs, the majority of whom had seen service in the jungles of Malaysia fighting the Communists insurgents. We went to Vietnam knowing that we could live up to the reputation of our forefathers. We were tough, no task was to difficult or threatening.

Patrolling in War Zone D for the first time gave us the opportunity to prove our ability, we moved silently through the dense green jungle, playing Charlie at his own game, our platoon spread out over some 500 yards, each man knowing his job as we endeavoured to find Charlie before he found us.

Being short timers in country, along with the rest of the Brigade, we were yet to discover the Viet Cong tunnels we had heard so much about. This was to be short lived.

A signal was transferred down the line of our patrol from our left hand element. We halted, taking up our positions ensuring that every man was on full alert. Hand signals were the only permitted method of communication. A tunnel had been located. Close in, was the signal, form a defensive perimeter around the tunnel. I was late in the afternoon our night harbour position was a further 2000 yards. We had engineers travelling with Company Headquarters, they had trained in tunnel chasing, it was their task to clear them.

Radio communications with CHQ advised that the tunnel would have to be cleared by our patrol as the engineers would not reach us prior to night fall. The word was passed that a volunteer was required to clear a tunnel, our Sergeant picked a volunteer.

The tunnel dropped straight down for about four feet then veered off at right angles, fresh foot prints could be seen at the entry to the tunnel. Our volunteered soldier was naturally apprehensive about the task ahead of him.

Permission was granted to reach down over the edge and direct automatic fire down the branch of the tunnel. Two mags of automatic fire, two frag grenades and another two mags of automatic fire, we could feel the tension in the air as our volunteer took hold of his torch and carbine, his eyes met those of our Sergeant's, it was obvious that our Sergeant was also concerned about the outcome, taking a deep breath that we all simultaneously took with him, he slid head first into the hole. Our hearts were pounding, nobody spoke. Then from the hole the silence was broken by a roar of laughter.

Those standing by raced to look down to the floor of the tunnel, only to see our volunteers feet sticking out. The tunnel ended some five feet in. Our volunteer squeezed himself back out and up and reported with a grin from ear to ear "tunnel cleared Sergeant"

From the Outback to the Ozark's: Aussie Settles in Missouri

The Society is pleased to announce that R.A. Tony Harris is now living in the USA. By way of introduction from Ray Payne former Chapter XI President and currently Chapter Secretary, Tony served with the 1st Royal Australian Regiment from June 1965 to June 1966, at that time the Regiment was attached to the 173rd Airborne Brigade (Sep). Tony served a second tour in Vietnam with the same Regiment and rose to the rank of Sergeant before his discharge in 1969.
