Editor's Note: One of the purposes of our Society is to keep alive the spirit which sustained and supported Sky Soldiers in the performance of duty. An inspirational force for us all was the example of those men who performed above and beyond the call of duty, frequently making the supreme sacrifice. This is the eighth in a series of reminders of those brave men with whom we were privileged to be associated.

STAFF SERGEANT LARRY S. PIERCE, RA19597808 GO No. 7, Department of the Army, 24 Feb 1966

By direction of the President, under the Joint Resolution of Congress approved 12 July 1862 (amended by act of 3 March 1863, act of 9 July 1918 and act of 25 July 1963), the Medal of Honor for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty is awarded posthumously by the Department of the Army in the name of the Congress to:

Staff Sergeant Larry S. Pierce, RA 19597808, United States Army, who distinguished himself by conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his own life above and beyond the call of duty while leading a Squad against hostile forces near Ben Cat, Republic of Vietnam, on 20 September 1965. Sergeant Pierce was serving as squad leader in a reconnaissance platoon when his patrol was ambushed by hostile forces. Through his inspiring leadership and personal courage, the squad succeeded in eliminating an enemy machine gun and routing the opposing force. While pursuing the fleeing enemy, the squad came upon a dirt road and, as

the main body of his men entered the road, Sergeant Pierce discovered an anti-personnel mine emplaced in the road bed. Realizing that the mine could destroy the majority of his squad, Sergeant Pierce saved the lives of his men at the sacrifice of his own by throwing himself directly onto the mine as it exploded. Through his indomitable courage, complete disregard for his own safety, and profound concern for his fellow soldiers, he averted loss of life and injury to the members of his squad. Sergeant Pierce's conspicuous gallantry, extraordinary heroism, and intrepidity at the cost of his own life, above and beyond the call of duty, are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of his country.

Tom Harvey, 173d in 1968-69, and current Deputy Administrator of the VA, has agreed to manage the Scholarship Program and keep it accelerating.

Sky Soldier KO's Mugger

Learn Atkins (Chapter I) had just gotten money from a "Bank money machine" on the street, one block from the White House Executive Office Building. As he turned to walk away, a man who had been standing in an alley watching Leam, approached. He pulled a knife, pointed it at Leam's throat and demanded the money. This Sky Soldier (Ranger and Special Forces) was incognito with his three piece suit and appeared as "easy pickins." He said "sure" in reply to the demand for money - threw the money in the air and then 1-2-3 - whop-bam-boom. The mugger didn't have a chance to run. He woke up in the hospital and was there three days. He was arrested, released on \$500 bond, skipped bail and that's the end so far.

Leam's story is different. His first action to grab the knife (which was all he could do), to keep from being stabbed, resulted in one finger being almost severed from the hand. Three and one half hours of surgery solved that problem and Leam is doing fine now.

We wish Learn the best in recovery and a thanks for demonstrating once again that the Airborne motto of "Preparedness" proves worthwhile in civilian life too. Muggers

Former Sky Soldier Receives Bronze Star

For George Yahyowan, the honor of receiving a Bronze Star came just about 20 years after earning it.

Yahyowan, a former long time Wapato resident now residing in Lyle, was presented the Bronze Star last week on Memorial Day. Making the special presentation was Don Green, adjutant of the Goldendale American Legion post.

The award credits Yahyowan for exceptionally valorous action on Jan. 24, 1968, while serving as a military policeman during a combat mission in Vietnam.

On that January day almost 20 years ago his unit, the 545th Military Policy Company, came under intense attack. According to the commendation, "...Yahyowan exposed himself to hostile fire as he directed return fire upon the enemy positions.

"Disregarding his own safety, he waded into a river, showing the remaining vehicles the ford, thus allowing his convoy to continue."


The commendation goes on to explain that Yahyowan's display of personal bravery and devotion to duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Yahyowan was cited to receive the Bronze Star shortly after the incident occurred, but for one reason or another, the formal presentation never did take place. That oversight was rectified last week when the Goldendale American Legion post formally presented Yahyowan with the special medal.

But for the former Wapato resident, getting recognized officially for his actions during his military career is nothing new. It is believed Yahyowan is the most decorated native American this state has ever produced.

Other military awards that has been bestowed upon him include the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with palm medal, the Vietnam Civic Action medal, the Vietnam Presidential Citation, the Vietnam Service medal, the Vietnam Campaign medal and the National Defense medal. He has also received the Letter "V" award, the Presidential Unit Citation ribbon, the Meritorious Unit commendation and various marksman and expert weapon performance medals.

The list is long, but so was the time Yahyowan spent on tours of duty in Vietnam. He first stepped on foreign soil on May 5, 1965. Four years later, to the very day, he finally said goodbye to Vietnam.

"You might say May fifth is kind of special to me," Yahyowan said. "I arrived in Vietnam then, and that was the day I got to leave."

All told, he is credited with nearly 48 months of combat duty in Vietnam.

NOTES FROM THE FIELD

"Call Signs" — A Source of Unit Pride From Col Walt Daniel

I really enjoy the Society newsletter and was especially taken by the section called NOTES FROM THE FIELD. Lawrence Snair, in his article on the origin of the nickname "the herd" mentioned radio call signs. I'll be the first to admit that we kept them to long-in fact, so long that they were "captured" by the enemy on more than one occasion. Nevertheless, they were a source of unit pride equal in all respects to the unit names that resulted from WW II and the conflict in Korea. What soldier does not remember the famous and heroic 26th Inf Regt of WW II and the "Blue Spaders", The 503rd Abn Inf as the "Rock", and the Korean conflict 32nd Inf as the "Buccaneers"? I don't know the origin of these nicknames but I do know that our Vietnam call signs were every bit their equal and I would like to read in the newsletter of other call signs that came to be associated with a particular unit of the Herd.

In my own experience, the longest kept (at least in 1965) call sign for Co A, 1st Bn (Abn) 503d Inf was DIESEL STAMP — not as glamorous as CASPER or COWBOY but more important than I realized at the time. Evidence the following:

A considerable time after Co A's call sign had been compromised and changed, I listened in while one of the squad leaders issued attack order. One of his soldiers asked, "sergeant, is this a DSC?" The sergeant replied, "yes". I interrupted at this point saying, "we are going to attack, but no one is assured that they will get a Distinguished Service Cross". The sergeant, quick in his response, said, "Sir, he's not asking about medals, he just wants to know if this is a Diesel Stamp Command or not". Unit pride was the issue. In the mind of that soldier, an attack order by DIESEL STAMP (the company) was more important than one ordered by any higher headquarters. The nickname DIESEL STAMP may not be as catchy as others earned in combat, but to me (and I hope to other members of Co A, 1st of the 503d) it's as good as BLUE SPADES, almost as good as THE ROCK, and like CASPER, it's a name worth fighting for!



## "The Glass Wall"

The New York Vietnam Veterans Memorial at 55 Water Street in Manhattan was conceived and constructed to acknowledge the service and sacrifice of those men and women from across the country who did their individual and collective best during the Vietnam War. This Memorial is not meant to imply approval or disapproval of the purpose or conduct of the War. Neither is it to honor only those who fought or those who fell, although one-third of the 75 people whose thoughts are etched into its surface did die as a result of combat.

The Memorial, which is 66 feet long and 16 feet high, was dedicated on 7 May 1985, the Tenth Anniversary of the official end of American Military involvement in Indochina. (The 5th of May marked the 20th Anniversary of the 173d Abn. Bde. arrival in Vietnam.) It is intended to evoke reconciliation and an awareness of the enduring human values which are reflected in the conflicting experiences of the Vietnam War. While its purpose is not only to remember the Roster of the Dead, the Memorial Honors those who died and celebrates life for those who returned. It embodies the contradictory yet universally shared experiences of War and Peace, Danger and Relief, Weakness and Strength, Isolation and Comradeship. Just as the Memorial invites reflection, so too are visitors invited to leave their own thoughts and mementos on the granite shelf which runs along both sides of the wall.

The excerpts etched into the Memorial were chosen from letters, diary entries, and poems, written by Americans during the Vietnam Era, which were submitted to the New York Vietnam Veterans Memorial Commission. These quotes are supplemented by News Dispatches and Public Statements about the War. It is fitting that the Memorial is located one block east of Fraunces Tavern, where George Washington Bade Farewell to his Officers at the end of the Revolutionary War.

#### **Veteran Activities**

- Memorial Service for two Medal of Honor winners Nov. 20-22, New York City and Jersey City, New York Chapter.
- 23-26 Oct City of Philadelphia dedicated its memorial to the Vietnam Veterans. Activities included Vet reunions, special events and a dedication parade.
- 2 Oct-6 Oct Australian Vietnam Forces National Reunion. Commencing at 0900 on Sat 3 Oct 87, an estimated 20,000 Australian and Allied Vietnam Veterans marched through the streets of Sydney. We are expecting an After Action Report from Larry Okendo and his wife who are among those representing the 173d at this once in a lifetime week of comradeship and memories. At press time they are still in Australia still on R&R.

*** The total casualty list for the 2nd Platoon was 17 wounded and 1 KIA *** when a guy is not seriously wounded it's time for laughs, because he knows he's in for rest and "ghost time" **** We start Joking, taking pictures *** All this I guess is a means of keeping your mind off the troopers that arent' breathing and wrapped in their ponchos. We mourn for them only once at the Memorial Service. After that We talk of them only in good spirits in reference to the good times we had or possibly a funny incident ***
