Background:

I am a proud native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. I've resided in Southern California for more than 36 years. I hold graduate and postgraduate credentials. Over those years, I served within the post-secondary educational arena as a director of operations for schools offering a wide range of career vocations.

By far my most challenging and last assignment was that of high school principal for male youth offenders. I reluctantly retired in 2006 due to a variety of infirmities directly and indirectly related to my Viet Nam injuries.

Military Highlights:

Even though I had recently married, I volunteered for the draft in the summer of 1966. I completed

basic at Ft Jackson and AIT at Fort Gordon. After a brief leave from Benning I reported to A/2/503, in Bien Hoa the afternoon of Feb. 21, 1967. That evening we were told that a historic "Blast" was scheduled the following dawn. When I finally figured out what a Blast was, I was overjoyed when I was told I wouldn't be jumping. Not knowing my ass from a hole in the wall, I was not the least bit disappointed. That following dawn the first and only combat jump during the Vietnam War was successfully executed. Soon after, however, I

realized the significance of this undertaking. I guess it just wasn't supposed to be.

Somehow or another, I was assigned as an RTO and there I remained for the greater portion of my tour. I suffered minor shrapnel wounds in March and April, but a grenade wound placed me in the 93rd Evacuation Hospital at Long Binh from Mothers' Day until I reported back to the line June 16, 1967. My infamous claim to Herd fame is I am one of only a handful to have survived both the June 22, 1967, Battle of the Slopes and five months later; Hill 875.

After Nam, I was stationed at Ft. Campbell where I was made a cook because they needed an E-5 in the slot. Without question, the best duty imaginable.

In 2008, along with two other Herd brothers returned to Viet Nam where my good friend, Les Fuller described, as "The in-country R&R they still owed us." In 2011, I made a second journey and three of us successfully summited both Hills 875 and 882, again a feat that was probably a first by actual combatants from the battles.

In April 2016, I was accompanied by a Gold Star sister, Brenda Underwood. Brenda's brother Lonnie Floyd, (4th Battalion) was KIA in January 1967. She'd promised herself that if the opportunity ever presented itself, she'd returned to Viet Nam and find the site where Lonnie was killed. Thanks to her unstinting determination, we found the Tay Ninh site. If you'd like to know the all-inclusive story, you'll have to check with Brenda. You can find videos of both 875 and the Slopes on my Facebook site or on YouTube.

I made it crystal clear upon my return home after this last foray that it was my last. My Viet Nam bucket list was completed. Or so I thought. I was recently invited to join a United States Department of Defense Recovery Agency team in its mission to identify three 173rd brothers whose remains have yet to be reconciled from Hill 875. I, along with two chopper pilots, Steve Greene, Casper Platoon, 173d Airborne Brigade and Jim McLaughlin, Cowboys, 335th Assault Helicopter Company, both of whom flew countless perilous missions throughout the siege that November, 49 years ago. We will join a crack team of anthropologists and MIA experts this February.

We are supremely proud to be a part of this duty. It should also be noted; this will be the first time a mission to Hill 875 will include actual combatants who had "boots on the ground and eyes in the sky."

I've often been asked, "Would you do it again?" My emphatic response is and always will be: Absolutely, not! However, the memories of those who weren't so fortunate to make it home and the brotherhood engendered by the men I call my brothers is unquantifiable.

If you were to ask anyone who served with me in Viet Nam, I'd expect they'd say, I was a decent soldier. Someone they could always rely on in the best and worst of times. Since I reconnected with the Herd a dozen years or so ago, the relationships I've engendered with my fellow sky soldiers has done more for my mental well-being than any psychiatrist ever could. To represent this esteemed body would be an honor and a privilege.

one question. Ready? Where was the first functional "Backpack Parachute" invented. My old high school buddy, Ben Gill was my house quest recently during our 50th reunion. One of our football team mates who passed a year ago worked as the volunteer at the Aviation Museum in Lexington, KY. The last exhibit Max Hellmueller worked on was still on display so we decided to pay a visit. You know I'm beginning to like these small museums that are in most communities. As we wandered through I was amazed at some of the first attempts at flight and associated items. This is where we walked up to a case displaying the first backpack parachute. I could not believe it. The actual chute was made of white

silk and hanging several feet above us. Inside was the actual chute comprised of a canvas covered piece of plywood with shrouds laced in. It was waded on top and covered with an aluminum dome. The dome was released by pull cord attached to a cotter pin. Lexington native Solomon van Meter Jr., a WWI pilot, received a patent for the device in July 1916. It was his desire to save pilots by offering

a means to safely exit the airplane instead of dying in the crash. From 1919 to 1925 the US Government produced three thousand six hundred and ninety one backpack parachutes at a cost of \$350.24 per chute. Since Solomon was an officer in the Army Air Corps he was

technically an employee and no royalties or bonuses were paid by the government. After the war, Van Meter resigned his commission and sued for the royalties. He won the case and received \$12.50 for each parachute produced as a "reasonable" royalty.

Last month I reported on a bench project sponsored by Bill Terry and the Sky Soldiers of Chapter 17. Unfortunately the photos I submitted were not included and the photos to go with Bill Terry's report were used.

Generation One (the nickname given to the Vietnam era of Sky Soldiers) and Generation Two (the nickname given to the post 2000 generation of Sky Soldiers) need to start coming together to keep the Association strong. It is also important for Generation Two paratroopers to become involved and spread the word of the Association to their fellow current and former Sky Soldiers.

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

reetings once again Sky Soldiers, It is a few days after Thanksgiving of 2016. I am thankful to be alive for these past sixty-six years, and more so to have been a Christian for the last forty-six. I came to faith in Christ at the age of twenty after having lived through a year and a half of service in the Airborne Infantry in Vietnam, '69-70.

But I am a youngster compared to men like Colonel Richard Boland who at the age of ninety five breathed his last a few months ago in California. Last October, myself and about 40 Skysoldiers gathered at his home for a brief memorial service. His wife Thyra had some pictures depicting the Colonel's service over three wars. This American warrior served with the 101st Airborne Division, jumping into Normandy and Holland on Operation Market Garden. He also fought at the defense of Bastogne as a machine gunner. Some of the thoughts that he penned were telling as he recollected the lives that he had taken in those bloody conflicts. He also fought in Korea as a Lieutenant who took a hill by night from the Chicoms with the loss of only six men. He was the First Battalion CO who trained troops for two years on Okinawa before their deployment to Vietnam in '65. He too was the man who played the song Rawhide by Frankie Valle after Reveille and gave us the moniker, 'The HERD'.

As I listened to some of the stories of those who had served with Col. Boland I was impressed with the man's love of country and his love for his troops. In the

midst of his personal struggles with the brutality of armed conflict and the part he played in destroying his nation's enemies he became a very hard man. And war does that to a man. Killing another human being in armed conflict is grim business but often necessary in order to avoid even greater tragedy. Those who form the tip of the spear in the fight against injustice in this world bear a heavy burden. They must be absolutely resolved to stop an enemy, and at the same time not relinquish their essential humanity.

I think that the Psalmist referred to this in the following verses:

Psalm 120:1,2 A Song of Degrees, "In my distress I cried to the Lord, and He heard me. Deliver my soul from lying lips, and from a deceitful tongue."

Psalm 120:6,7 "My soul has dwelt too long with one who hates peace. I am for peace, but when I speak, they are for war."

When I first read these words, having just returned from Vietnam and the madness of war, I felt that I needed to be delivered from the cold-heartedness that almost swallowed me up. I wanted peace, but there was the conflict within. War makes a man callous to normal human feelings. How can you kill or injure another without turning off your feelings of compassion and empathy for those who you are hurting. The problem is how to regain that compassion for your own loved ones. Only the Lord can heal a wounded soul. Only He can understand and make me whole again.

As I considered the life of Colonel Boland and heard his wife relate how he wondered what awaited him before God after his death, I would have liked to assure him that the God of David and other mighty warriors of old would be kind to those who sincerely sought peace with their Maker through faith in the only begotten Son of God. Trusting in the One who waged a successful war against the enemy of the souls of mankind, not with physical weapons but with the weapons of truth, integrity and implicit obedience to the will of God. Jesus gave us an example of a real man, a man in control of his own passions yet tender towards the needs and frailties of others. Jesus took on the responsibility of others just as patriots down through the centuries have taken on the defense of those too weak to defend themselves. He bore the brunt of a Holy God's anger

towards a world of men incited by Satan to rebel against their Creator, just as he had done. The many conflicts between nations reflect the conflict between good and evil that exists in the unseen. Yet in the midst of our internal struggles to reconcile what we are called to do as fighting men and our innate sense that killing one another is unnatural, we are called to exercise our abilities to discern between good and evil, to do the good and to refrain from the evil.

God has given us who serve in the Armed Forces, as did our fathers and as do our sons, a hard task. To do a work that most will never do, and to do it well. And to live with the inevitable regrets of having in points small and great failed to do what we knew we should have done. It is a matter of conscience. As life on this planet draws to its close may we not just hope for the best but rather receive the

Good News that Christ died, was buried, and rose again triumphant over death. The Scripture says that he that personally believes in Jesus as God's acceptable sacrifice for the redemption of the human race will never die. Our body may cease to function but the spirit is preserved in the presence of Him who gave His life that we might live. Those of us who have seen the wreckage of bodies torn by weapons of war, both friend and foe, can never forget those sights, sounds and smells. But we can have peace with God through faith in His Son and peace in our hearts while living a life worth the living here on earth. And the expectation of a joyful life to come when wars are no more.

Sky Soldiers' Gun Line Makes it Rain Steel

APO TEULADA, Italy – "All right you know what to do gentlemen. Make it rain steel," said Staff Sgt. Lyle Bennett, a Section Chief assigned to 4th Battalion, 319th Airborne Field Artillery Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade. One-by-one, 155mm artillery rounds eject from concealed fighting positions.

From a distance, the barrel of the 9,300-pound M777 Lightweight Howitzer can only be seen by the remnants of smoke, forming the gun line.

Sky Soldiers assigned to 4-319 AFAR, brought their M777 and M119A3 Howitzers to Sardinia, Italy, to participate in exercise Summer Tempest 16. Participating militaries also included artillery units from France, Italy and Slovenia.

The purpose of Summer Tempest is to integrate the Arty Fires Control System link between the Italians and French Fire Direction Centers with 4-319 AFAR digitally, said 1st Lt. Richard Rainey, 2nd Platoon Leader assigned to Battery C, 4th Battalion, 319th Airborne Field Artillery Regiment.

"This system enables better communications so that gun teams on ground are more accurate with their howitzers and effectively increase payload output," said Rainey. "[It] gives us the opportunity to exercise our ability to provide indirect fires to our NATO Allies and partners."

The Arty Fires Control System is designed for field artillery fire control in accordance with the tasks of modern war management. The system is interoperable with the command information system of joint forces, found in the U.S. Army Tactics, Techniques and Procedures for Corps Artillery, Division Artillery, and Field Artillery Brigade Operations field manual.

But even with new technology in modern day warfare make no mistake; life on the gun line is no cakewalk. Gun teams must be efficient in conducting their fire missions to inflict the most damage during a short period of time before their location is identified and return fire.

The mission of field artillery is to provide firepower during combat operations, enabling joint and maneuver commanders to complete their missions. Field Artillery paratroopers are trained in tactics, techniques and procedures for the employment of fire support systems, found in U.S. Army Tactics, Techniques and Procedures for the Field Artillery field manual.

"[We] are the heart of the battery. [We're] the part of the battery that actually controls the howitzers," said Spc. Jacob Fisher, assistant gunner assigned to Battery C, known as Chaos. "At times life on the gun line can be tough, it's hard work, and then there's downtime which can be stale. But when it actually comes down to receiving a fire mission, it's pretty exciting."

Each gun team understands the lethality of their mission, approaching both dry and live fire training with dedication and grit. But firing the round and seeing the end result is worth it, said Fisher.

"Getting to pull the lanyard is the best thing about my job. I am the person who actually gets to fire the round," said Fisher.





Having previously trained with militaries from France, Germany, Italy and Poland, and ongoing [rotation in the Baltics], the brigade regularly trains with their NATO Allies and partners. The success of the battery relies on each individual because even the simplest mistake can take a gun out of the fight or even cost a life, said Sgt. Terry Riley, an ammunition team chief assigned to 4-319 AFAR.

"The gun line is very intense and we love showing our strength as the King of Battle. This job definitely develops camaraderie and when we're on the gun line, the success of the battery relies on each individual on a team," said Riley.

"We've trained with our NATO Allies and partners before and every time we do, it's another opportunity to learn, and of course blow something up."

As the night skies draw near, the team continues to move in a rhythmic dance. Everyone on the team echoes the verbal commands as each step in loading and reloading the gun is vital to the success of their mission.

The radio crackles from the truck. "End of mission," the artillery chief calls to his team.

They echo in return, "End of mission." The volley of fires is complete. The team awaits marching orders to pack up their gun and do it all over again upon receipt of a fires mission.

Summer Tempest is a multinational exercise designed to increase planning and communications systems, partnership building and develop common procedures for combined arms live fire, held Nov. 28 through December 6, 2016.

The 173rd Airborne Brigade, based in Vicenza, Italy, is the U.S. Army Contingency Response Force in Europe, capable of projecting forces to conduct the full range of military operations across the United States European, Central and Africa Commands areas of responsibility.

I forgot the soldier's name but later discovered his name and picture in the 2016 summer issue. Vol. 32. No.3 of the "Sky Soldier" Magazine: SFC Michael Atchison.

I was and still am so proud of what you did for us and for your comment! My family and I want to thank you very much, SFC Michael Atchison, for your assistance in wrapping your left arm

around my waist, placing my right arm around your neck and lifting me upward and carrying me up the 200-foot gravel pathway hill to our car. I would serve with you anytime, anywhere and under the most extreme combat situations

Open Letter to the Queen of Soul

ear Ms. Franklin, Please accept my apology for this letter being 40 plus years overdue. In 1967, I was a 22-year-old combat medic with the 173d Airborne Brigade, the most decorated army brigade in Vietnam. We were dug-in in a river valley next to the Dak Po river in Kontum Province, Republic of South Vietnam. The valley was named Dak To which was about 50 miles by dirt road from the closest mountain village, in the rain-forested jungles of the

Central Highlands.

At any time during the day or night, from the surrounding hills and mountains, the North Vietnamese Army would rain down mortars and rockets on us killing and wounding scores of paratroopers and destroying critical supplies. Dak To was an extremely dangerous place in 1967, where over a four-month period we had hundreds of troopers killed and another thousand or so men wounded. We could never let our guard down in Dak To because the Cambodian border was just a few miles away where some 20,000 highly trained, battle-tested North Vietnamese soldiers were camped, poised to attack our position in the valley at any given moment. If we did come under a full attack and had to defend this valley, we would do so with a little better than 1,200 men. I don't mind admitting, and I'm not embarrassed to say that for this 22-year-old kid from Plainville, Connecticut it was a very stressful time and place to say the least.

Every day as dusk settled into night over the valley, you could hear the hum of generators being started that provided the only electricity for 50 miles around. The intermittent firing of our artillery into the surrounding hills and valleys kept the enemy off balance during the night and less likely to attack us. It's Saturday night in valley death, the enemy is taking a break from shelling us and the boredom is almost thick enough to cut with a knife, when through the crisp Dak To night air, as the moon rose above the dark peaks of the mountains, came the sweet sound of a familiar voice belting out the soulful words, "R-E-S-P-E-C-T find out what it means to me." Man, I say to myself, I'm missing home too much, could that be my girl way out here in this dusty hell-hole? I want to get closer to what I'm hearing so I follow the sound and it leads me to a rain poncho being used as a door to cover an under-ground bunker. In the bunker there

are a dozen grubby, tired and home-sick paratroopers and they were partying in this hole in the ground like there will be no tomorrow. On one side of the bunker, several paratroopers are harmonizing the background lyrics, and rocking to the beat of the music on the other side of the bunker are several other soldiers making up their own choreographed steps as they move to the rhythm of the music. It's a scene now etched into my heart and mind that will never be erased. This will be the start of a night in my life that I will never forget and it's not over yet.

About 2 a.m. in the morning I needed some fresh air so I stepped outside of that bunker. It wasn't long before my ears caught another familiar sound coming from the

night or giving us comfort on a bad day. Even today when I hear your music I smile, a warm feeling comes over me, and I get carried back to those spirit lifting parties in that infamous river valley of death in the Central Highlands of Vietnam, in 1967.

Ms. Franklin you may never know the depth of the love we old veterans have for you and your music, or the impact they had on us combat troops dug-in in the remote mountains and jungles of South Vietnam. When we were down and needed a double dose of love, you gave it to us in your music; through your music we were able to get through the hard times and terrifying moments that lay ahead of us.

Well Ms. Franklin, I'm 70 years old now and I don't think that I will ever get the

next bunker about 30 yards down the line of bunkers. "You make me feel like a natural woman," man, oh man, there is another party going on in the next underground bunker too. In this bunker there are another dozen or so paratroopers partying in the candle light, dancing by themselves while singing along at the top of their lungs with our "Queen of Soul,"

Ms. Aretha Franklin. There may be a war going on outside of the bunker, but inside the safety of the bunker there is a party going on and performing for us is Ms. Aretha Franklin, no charge. In 1967 we spent many nights in some of the world's most dangerous places on earth and you Ms. Franklin were always right there with us, helping us get through another tough

chance to hug you and thank you personally for all that you did for me and the tens of thousands of other soldiers 40 plus years ago, but please consider this, when you settle down to sleep and close your eyes please let your last thoughts for the night be about the tens of thousands of veterans who love you beyond words of expression and cherish those brief, precious times when you single-handedly stopped the war and took us home for a moment. God Bless you, and rest easy. I pray for your health and longevity.

he 50th anniversary reunion of the Milton Lee Olive, III, the first African-American to receive a Medal of Honor during the Vietnam War, and his 3rd Platoon was held in historic Olive Park in Chicago, Illinois on October 22, 2015.

The event marked the 50th anniversary of Olive's death. Olive, whom the family fondly called "Skipper," paid the ultimate price on October 22, 1965, during a search and destroy mission in Vietnam.

On that fateful day Olive, who, just 16-days before his 19th birthday, spotted a live grenade, placed the device on his stomach and allowed it to explode. His act of heroism saved the lives of four men, John "Hop" Foster, Lionel Hubbard, Sgt. Vince Yrineo and the only surviving soldier, retired Capt. Jimmy B. Stanford.

Milton Lee Olive, III, attended several Chicago public schools before leaving school to live with his paternal grandfather in Lexington, Mississippi. When his father, Milton B. Olive, II, found out where he was, he gave him three choices: get a job, go back to school or join the military.

Skipper joined the Army in 1964

and as a paratrooper serving in the 3rd Platoon Company B, 2nd Battalion (Airborne) 503rd Infantry 173 Airborne Brigade, had already been awarded a Purple Heart.

Upon his death, President Lyndon B. Johnson presented Olive's father, the late Milton B. Olive, II and stepmother, Antoinette Mainor Olive, the Medal of Honor and a second Purple Heart during a White House ceremony.

In 1966, Mayor Richard J. Daley named Olive Park after young Milton erecting a plaque in his honor. Olive/Harvey College was also named in his honor.




In about 40 minutes, all the Names were read and the readers promised to be there next year and left to pursue the lives that so many in ANC had died to preserve.


PFC Milton Olive III from the third Platoon, B Company (Bravo Bulls), 2-503rd Parachute Infantry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade (SEP) was Killed in Action Oct. 22, 1965. The Citation for the resulting Medal

of Honor which was presented posthumously, in part, reads:

"Although the platoon was subjected to a heavy volume of enemy gunfire and pinned down temporarily, it retaliated by assaulting the Viet Cong positions, causing the enemy to flee. As the platoon pursued the insurgents, PFC Olive and four other soldiers were moving through the jungle together when a grenade was thrown in their midst. PFC Olive saw the grenade, and then saved the lives of his soldiers at the sacrifice of his own by grabbing the grenade in his hand and falling on it to absorb the blast with his body. Through his bravery, unhesitating actions, and complete disregard for his safety, he prevented additional loss of life or injury to the members of his platoon."

Robert Toporek, one of those who carried the body of PFC Olive out of the jungle, decided to have a reunion in Chicago of the remaining members of Olive's rifle squad on the 50th anniversary of his sacrifice. Wayne Short, Samuel Grimes, William Yates and Mark Mitchell showed up to mark the date when Olive sacrificed himself for them. PFC Olive was born and raised in Chicago where a Park, a community college and a portion of McCormick Place bear his name.



August


