### **Bio of Guest Speaker COL William L Ostlund**



Enlisting in the Army in 1983, Colonel Ostlund served with the 1st Battalion, 75th Rangers and was stationed at Hunter Army Airfield through 1987. As a Staff Sergeant he transitioned to the Nebraska National Guard's Long Range Surveillance Detachment and simultaneously enrolled at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and joined their ROTC program.

Colonel Ostlund was commissioned as a Distinguished Military Graduate in the Infantry and re-entered the active Army in 1990. He served as a Platoon Leader and Company Executive Officer in 3rd Battalion, 187th Infantry

Regiment – 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault). This tour included service in OPERATION DESERT SHIELD and DESERT STORM. He was then assigned to 2nd Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment where he again served as a Platoon Leader and a Company Executive Officer. Colonel Ostlund commanded B Company, 2nd Battalion, 9th Infantry (mechanized) in the Republic of Korea and then attended graduate school at The Fletcher School, Tufts University prior to being assigned as an Associate Professor in the United States Military Academy's Department of Social Sciences where he taught American Politics and International Security Studies.

Colonel Ostlund was subsequently stationed in Vicenza, Italy where he served as the Southern European Task Force's Chief of Operations, Operations Officer - 1st Battalion (Airborne) 508th Infantry, and Operations Officer – 173rd Airborne Brigade; this assignment included service in the BALKANS and the combat parachute jump into OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. He then served in the U.S. Strategic Command's Plans and Policy Division as the Chief, European Support Section and Combating Weapons of Mass Destruction Planner. Colonel Ostlund returned to Italy to command 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion (Airborne), 503<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Regiment – The ROCK – of the 173<sup>rd</sup> Airborne Brigade Combat Team. While in command of The ROCK, he deployed his unit for 15 months to Afghanistan in support of OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM. Upon return, Colonel Ostlund served as the Deputy Commander of the 75th Ranger Regiment. From this position, he deployed to Afghanistan several times for a total of 15 months and twice served as the Commander for a Joint Inter-Agency Special Operations Counterterrorism Task Force. Colonel Ostlund next completed a Senior Service College Fellowship at The Fletcher School prior to commanding 3rd Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division. The BCT formed Combined Task Force DUKE and deployed for nine months in support of OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM. COL Ostlund next served as the Executive Officer to the Commander, U.S. Special Operations Command. Currently, COL Ostlund serves as the Director, Commander's Action Group in CENTCOM.

Colonel Ostlund holds a Bachelor degree in Political Science from the University of Nebraska at Omaha and a Master of Arts in International Relations from The Fletcher School. His military education includes the Command and General Staff Officers Course, Joint and Combined Warfighting School, and he served as a Senior Service College Fellow at Tufts University.

Colonel Ostlund has been deemed a Distinguished Member of the 503<sup>rd</sup> Parachute Infantry Regiment and the 75<sup>th</sup> Ranger Regiment. He authored "Tactical Leader Lessons Learned in Afghanistan", published in Military Review (July/August 2009), "Irregular Warfare: Counterterrorism Forces in Support of Counterinsurgency Operations", published by the Institute of Land Warfare (September 2012), and "Conventional Force and Special Operation Forces: Interoperability and Interdependence" published by the Institute of Land Warfare (October 2014). He is married and he has three sons.
